Similarly, they're the engineers that designed our wastewater plant, met with their representatives to go over some of the rehab that needs to be done.

I've been working with Brad from Triple Tree Engineering on getting everything wrapped up for the splash park. I have a list of ticket items that I would like to see complete. Same goes for the sewer project, the storm sewer project. I was told they'd be back in August. Now it's September 13th is the new date that was given to me.

Once again, they have quite a sizable list of items that need to be completed. A light was installed at Splash Park and it is supposed to shut off during the day, but right now it's staying on. I called the electricians and let them know. So lights it up really good at night. But yeah, unfortunately, there's supposed to be a sensor on it.

Not supposed to be on during the days.

Get that fixed.

I have been working with Tricata. They have sent me a trial camera. This has been about a month back now, and I've been dealing with them off and on. For our needs, they sent me the top of the line models, 4K model, I think, in MSRP's for \$100. Not

sure we would need something like that.

that. I would recommend 2 5 megapixel outdoor dome cameras. They also carry those with at least a 30 day retention time on the camera itself. Just if you have to go back. So yeah, one camera is \$1,800 for the one and then they do have a year.

Three-year, five-year subscription for their cloud. A three-year cloud subscription for one camera is about \$659. So, and then I know we had some citizens concerned about security information, and I talked a lot to Rortana about their security stuff, sending off all their security information, so...

I flat out asked him, I was like, do you guys want this footage to crane AI or do anything like that? He said, no, absolutely not. We don't. There's a...

There's a thing in their security thing, it's called a enterprise controlled encryption, which is an ECE. And customers, there are customers that do opt into it for their AI features, but you have to opt into it. The camera system, you're not.

And I'll pop it in automatically.

any AI assisted thing or anything like that. The cameras do have the ability to blur faces too. So if the cops, technically the cops would be the only ones that would technically have to remove any boring if we needed to do that to see who might be doing something nefarious.

Once again, I know you guys have touched on it, but this isn't, it's not about surveillance, it's about security. It's about protecting our property that the taxpayers want us to protect. So that's what's behind us. We had a lot of instances where the cops had to go down to the pool this year. So is that where you're intending to put him is?

Correct. Out front, one facing front of the pool, the whole parking lot area, and then another on the eave that would actually cover the splash park and everything this way. And so your only intent to even look what's on those cameras is if something happens. Correct.

cameras, same company, cameras, bait detection, because you can't have cameras in a bathroom. So they actually have bait detection. They have their, basically their lockdown system is through them too. So I didn't just pick these people out of the air. It's something that people I can talk to in the local area.

And the number one thing I've heard is great customer service. Another thing that goes a long ways is DIS, our tech group already works with Faircotta too. That's another thing. They're already a rep for them. So they're already familiar with their system.

But just like to clarify, we have a camera at the library as it came with the entrance and exit of the building. We do have a policy related to how that information is distributed. Right. Writer note, our first testing for PFAS in our drinking water came back with no detection, so that's good. Just once again, PFAS is, call it a cancer-causing byproduct of a lot of manufacturing, Scotchgard, plastics, all that sort of thing.

Like I thought, they're finding it more over on the eastern side of the, where there's more manufacturing. So we have to do three more tests. DEQ pays for these initial tests though, so it doesn't really hurt our pocketbook any.

We have dura patch potholes and asphalt patching has been done in areas around town. The new playground equipment is almost complete at the ball fields. If you guys haven't seen that, go take a look. I think it's pretty cool actually. It's a lot bigger than I thought it was. Yeah, it looks pretty good. Tim's done a great job. So yeah, he's almost done with that.

So, just trying to get it, it works for now, but I can see if those cracks are going to get paid, so just trying to get it replaced under warranty.

Yeah, I'm here to make an annual board report for annotated this should be happening. So I'm here to talk about fiscal year 25-26. For operation, our use of the library has been leveling out since post-pandemic growth. Our library visits are down 6% from the previous year.

Total circulation is down 8%, our program attendance is up 3%. We have a lot of... If you don't know, you should go learn. We've got Libby and Hoopla. So our digital items tend to be higher than the state average. Their circulation of those items is about 25 percent. Our library circulation is 30.5. The Hoopla is expensive. We pay for that. Libby is connected to the library.

Every library has Libby, something that we purchase per checkout. And it's getting a little expensive, so there might be some limits on that in the future. Just have to look at circulation. We have some new programs that started last year, a graphic novel class for upper elementary students.

in the library, which has been really fun. We've got two classes going there, chair and flow. It's my little joy. I love my class. We have a new library assistant. Her name is Riley. She commutes in from Shoto. She's getting her degree in English. She's very excited to be at our library. That increased

The position before was Darla. That increased from 8 hours to 24 hours so that we can enhance operations, programming, and just also allow for flexible coverage. You

know, last year when someone was sick or...

needed surgery or hospital or family stuff, we didn't have a lot of coverage, so it's nice to have more. We completed some big capital projects last year. We have a new HVAC system that was a total cost of a little under \$187,000. Tiffany was able to secure 75% grant funding.

that expense. She's been really busy grant searching and writing for us. We did some tuck pointing of the damaged exterior brickwork that's been completed. That was 100% grant funded and that was about 35 grand. We have some big projects thing to get completed this year. We need to abate the asbestos in our crawl space so that people can go down there and maintain our system. The total cost for that is about 60 grand. We are working, we've secured grant money for that. That should be anywhere from 75 to 100%.

grant funded. We're just winging. We applied for grants for solar panels. So we're going to get solar panels on our library this year. They're expected to cover 100% of our electricity usage. The total cost for that is a little under 75 grand and 75% of that is grant funded.

And then we're hoping to put some windows on the main floor for ventilation, daylight, egress purposes. That kid's room doesn't have any windows back there and we really need to have windows. That cost is pending. Apparently there's bars in the window.

that somehow need to be extricated from the building, which is a bigger project than we thought it was. Yeah, John and I looked at that and I was like, oh yeah, there's some bars on there. And then I really looked at it and I was like, it's like medieval type. Maybe to blow torch it off or something. Yeah, and two layers of box too.
